AZ MERIT & AIMS SCIENCE TESTING

AzMerit and AIMS Science testing will be here soon! It is important that our students be well prepared and take these tests seriously. We know that Desert Edge is an excellent High School, and the AzMerit and AIMS Science tests are one way we show the rest of the world that - We Are DE!

We will have special schedules for all of our AzMerit Testing and early release day for AIMS Science. All testers will begin testing at 8:10 a.m. All others will have a later start. Please consult the DEHS website for the AzMerit & AIMS Bell Schedule for exact times each day.

English I, Honors English II, Honors English II, English III and AP Language students will be testing on Monday April 1st (Reading) and Tuesday April 2nd (Writing).

All of our students currently taking Biology or Agriculture II as well as students who have already taken biology but not AIMS tested will be taking the AIMS Science test on Wednesday April 3.

Algebra I, Honors Algebra I, Algebra II, Honors Algebra II, Geometry, and Honors Geometry will be testing April 15th and 16th.

Our teachers and support staff have been working diligently all year to prepare your students for these days, and now we ask for your help. Students should be well **rested**, well **fed**, and **have all of their technology** in top shape for the testing! Students who miss testing will miss additional class time for makeup testing!

ADVANCED PLACEMENT

Desert Edge students are planning to take a variety of Advanced Placement exams this spring. AP teachers are working with their students to prepare them to take the exam. Students may earn college credit and academic distinction through their AP exam success.

This year the exams will occur between May 6 and May 16. The district will help assist in covering the cost by paying 50% for the first two exams and covering the cost of each additional exam.

Most tests begin at the start of school on our campus; however, some tests do begin at 12:00 p.m. The testing schedule and other test details are mandated by The College Board and is the same throughout the United States.

ENGLISH



It has been a busy semester! Freshmen are finishing Romeo and Juliet where students have thoroughly enjoyed connecting the film to the text and looking at vocabulary in context. Sophomores just finished an either an argumentative essay or the Titanic project and once they return from spring break, they will work on their PBL. The Honors sophomore class will be building a quilt square that displays one out of the thirty Universal Declarations of Human Rights that they have selected. The materials for this project were purchased with grant money thanks to the Agua Fria Foundation!

Juniors are working through the novel The Great Gatsby focusing on the theme and preparing for the upcoming "Night of Excellence" projects. Students will wrap up the unit with the viewing of the 2013 film. In AP Language & Composition, students are focusing on rhetorical analysis and preparing for the upcoming AP exam.

Seniors are wrapping up the senior research paper and during the fourth quarter will be studying various novels such as Things They Carried or 1984. In AP Literature & Composition, students are reading Brave New World by Aldous Huxley for their dystopian unit, as well as preparing for the upcoming AP Exam.

Last, but not least, in the Read 180 program, the students have just finished writing a literary analysis from a chapter in the book, *The Absolutely True Diary of a Part-Time Indian, by Alexie Sherman. Students learned to look at evidence from the text and analyze it; it was a difficult task at first, but after much practice, many grasped the concept.*

SOCIAL STUDIES



Desert Edge's *We the People* team competed in the State Competition on Friday, January 11, 2019 and won Unit awards and recognition for their knowledge in Political Philosophy and International Politics and Citizenship. Our AP classes are continuing to focus on preparing for the AP Exams in May. World History classes participated in a simulation on the Scramble for Africa, created World War I technology advertisements and scrapbooks and created and analyzed propaganda pieces on the Rise of the Dictators. U.S. History classes worked on World War I propaganda posters and also compared 1920's themes such as mass media, education and music to today's themes. Government and Economics students worked on learning economic terms and theories and looked at the debate on minimum wage and argued whether or not it should be raised or remain the same. World Religion students took a field trip to a Sikh Gurdwara and a Buddhist Temple to expand on what they studied in the classroom this year.

MATH



The DE Math Department is having a great year. We continue to see the positive impact of 1-1 on our student's learning. Teachers are using the advantage of 1-1 to actively engage students with programs like Kahn Academy, Schoology, Desmos, Google Classroom and many other programs. Students are utilizing this benefit of real time personalized instruction that extends beyond the classroom, boosting their scores on performance assessments. Our interventions/enrichments programs such as Project Based Learning along with the Math Lab and others have made an incredible difference in student learning here at Desert Edge. The Math Lab, alone, has helped over 320 students this year. We have seen its impact helping a majority of attending Math Lab students to master the remediated standards. The Math Department is excited about the direction that the Math Lab is leading for student remediation. We are looking forward to the continued development of these programs and the positive impact they will have on the Desert Edge Community.

SCIENCE



Science has been doing a lot of experimentation and real world application in the 3rd Quarter. Biology is learning about evolution and ecology. They created comic books to tell the story of natural selection in rat populations. AP Biology learned about genetics and biotechnology. One of their projects was to create posters and 3D models to inform viewers about a virus. Environmental science worked on water, mining, forest, and agricultural issues. Some went on a field trip to the Salt River to help with ecological restoration efforts. In class they built water filters, analyzed forest fires using matches, mined chocolate chip cookies, and designed gardens. Physics had fun testing their cardboard cars. Lastly, various science students competed in STEMCon, a science/technology/engineering/math competition for our district schools.









Our Personal Development classes utilized our new badminton equipment and the unit was a huge success. The students really enjoyed learning the game, which also became a competitive sport offered at DE this school year. Personal Development classes are also finishing up the Illegal Substances unit in Heath. This is one of our most important units of this class. We encourage families to discuss strategies regarding peer pressure and other influences related to this issue with their children. Our Strength and Conditioning and Lifetime Fitness classes completed their mid-semester performance testing and saw significant gains in their scores. We are extremely excited to transition to the new field house and launch our physical abilities to an even higher level. Have a great spring semester. Let's finish strong!

BAND: The Instrumental music department has been hard at work preparing for concerts, celebrations, and festivals. Our guitar class es have been busy composing their own music with traditional chord progressions, and our percussion ensemble has graduated to large group productions. The DE Symphonic Band performed at their February Concert in preparation for their festival performance at Desert Mountain High School (where we received a good rating), and then again at home, here at Desert Edge, for our District-wide Fine Arts celebration.

DANCE: We just concluded our auditions for the 2019-2020 school year, and are so excited about the future of our Scorpion Dance Company. We had a total of 74 girls and boys come and audition during a 3 day process of learning choreography and techniques. We compiled two amazing classes for next school year and can't wait to see what our Performance and Advanced dancers have in store. We will continue and begin new class dance choreography after Spring Break and really focus on getting ready for our Spring Concert titled "In the Spotlight". Our Spring Concert will be May 8th-10th at the Desert Edge Performing Arts Center. We also are implementing our PBL projects in our Intermediate, Advanced, and Performance dance classes. These projects will be showcased at the "Night of Excellence" on April 18th. Our Performance Dancers had the great opportunity to perform and represent our Scorpion Dance Company at the 1st Annual District Fine Arts Festival. This event was a huge success and is going to be something we look forward to year after year.

CHOIR: Desert Edge's choir program continues to build in numbers and quality. This year's group of seniors have really raised the bar showing no signs of "senioritis" and inspiring the underclassmen to keep working hard until the end of the school year. In February, eight of our seniors were invited to sing the National Anthem at the Goodyear Ballpark for a spring training game. Many upper level choir members are in rehearsals for "Beauty and The Beast" which will open April 11th and run through April 13th. The District, along with our fabulous Boosters, recently held a Fine Arts Festival at Desert Edge which included dance, choir, theater, band and artists from all of our schools. DE Concert Choir has been invited to perform at a conference for School Superintendents at the end of March and last, but not least, we are working towards our Senior Honors Choir Concert (May 1 & 2 @ 7:00 PM) which will prove to be one of our best yet! VISUAL ARTS: Drawing/Painting/Foundations. Students in Mr. Galto's Fundamentals classes have been working on the foundations and elements of art, which included projects that utilized various mediums including charcoal, oil pastels, graphite, and colored pencil. Various students from these classes also saw some of their work displayed at the first Agua Fria High School District Fine Arts Showcase. Students were also introduced to easel drawing and were given time slots in which they utilized a different drawing perspective and were encouraged to draw using movement from the shoulder, rather than the wrist. Drawing and Painting 1 students also utilized various mediums and were encouraged to refine skills that they learned from previous Fundamentals classes. These students also enjoyed seeing their artwork displayed in the Fine Arts Showcase. Drawing and Painting 2 students worked on a collaborative mural project where they had to work in teams to brainstorm, design, and implement a final drawing for a large-scale wall mural. After completion of the mural, these students were also chosen to compete in the VANS Custom Culture shoe design contest. A high honor in which they were 1 of only 500 schools nationwide selected to participate. With real world applications, students are learning to set clear goals, create transparency, decide what will be accomplished, recognize their accomplishments, focus on processes (mapping things out), track their work visually, and finally, learn to effectively communicate with one another in a dedicated place. Students will also work on a cross collaborative project that involves both Art and Physics. With a grant provided through APS, students will explore scale and proportion, the theory of color, and how physics provides relatable ways to see the world through both.

Students will finish out the year with new challenges that will focus on refining their skills, learning and pushing the limits of various mediums, creating digital portfolios, and showcasing their work at Desert Edge's Night of Excellence. This is an exciting time to be an art student at Desert Edge, and through the Conservatory of Fine Art, students have access to quality programming, valuable time with teachers who are also working artists, and excellent materials that are helping prepare them for success outside of the classroom. Sculpture. All sculpture classes are focusing on applying design principles to their sculptures. During the third quarter student ceramic sculptors ap-

plied principles of rhythm and pattern to their personality coil pots. They included a power word to integrate typography into their design. There is a lot of expression in their designs. The other half of the class, focused on developing pottery wheel skills, by developing functional sculpture such as cups and bowls. The goal for the project is symmetry. All of the students demonstrated growth throughout the third quarter. Metal Sculpture. Metal sculpture students have learned many skills. First they focused on safety and then learned basic welding, cutting, and grinding skills. Their first project was to create 5-7 light steel cubes and then apply a design principle to their cubes to arrange into a sculpture. Please take a moment to look at their sculptural compositions. They are proud students.

THEATRE: The Theatre Dept. has had an exciting quarter with the Theatre I students just finishing their Historical Theatre project/ performances. Focusing on Greek Theatre, Elizabethan Theatre, Russian Theatre, Commedia dell'Arte, Kabuki and Vaudeville, the students culminated their projects with Benchmark performances in each style. The Theatre II students ended the quarter with their Benchmark partner scenes and Theatre III developed an original piece to be created for elementary age students. Their original tales offer a kind of Fairy-tale Mash-Up including *The Mystery of the Missing Candy House where Aurora & Midas work as detectives to solve the case ... (hint: it was Hansel & Gretel), The Tale of 1000 Wishes where two orphan girls stumble upon a Genie's lamp and The Tale of the 8th Dwarf featuring Stumpy (Think 6'3" dwarf!!).*

DE's Cutting Edge Theatre is in the throes of rehearsals for Disney's BEAUTY & THE BEAST. The cast did a "preview" at the AFUHSD Arts Festival and the feedback was phenomenal. The cast of 45 are an amazing group of talented and creative young people who are showing incredible maturity & dedication in their pursuit of Thespian excellence. We hope to see everyone at DE April 11-13th for this incredible production!
