

# Desert Edge 2021-2022 American/Arizona History Syllabus

## Welcome Parents & Students,

Welcome! We are very happy to have all of you for the 2021-2022 school year and hope to give you a great overview of American history. Below is a course description for the complete school year from August to May. At Desert Edge High School we want to focus on Rigor, Relevance, and Relationships. We know that last year was an unusual school year, but we are committed to developing relationships with our students and providing lessons that are relevant and rigorous as we start a new year. We "R" DE!

## **American/Arizona History Description**

This course is designed to challenge your ability to analyze primary source material, enhance your understanding of causation and chronology, and augment your comprehension of the political, cultural, and economic themes that run throughout American/Arizona History. This course will not only serve to further your understanding of historical content, but also develop sharper reading and writing skills.

We will examine the scope of history through an American lens and you will often serve as the historian as you interpret historical evidence, determine its relevance, identify point of view, and recognize the strengths and weaknesses that exist within the document. Critical thinking skills will be vital as the goal of this class is not to have you simply recount historical facts. We will be exploring topics from Early American Colonization to 21st Century Human Rights. The course is rigorous, but fulfilling as you will witness the growth and development of study skills, your ability to read and write critically, and your ability to evaluate primary and secondary source material.

#### **Student Materials Needed**

- Chromebook
- Spiral notebook (needed for bellwork, notes, and classwork)
- Pen/Pencil/Highlighter
  - 1 inch Binder for worksheets/guided notes
  - Project materials (optional): colored pencils, markers, scissors, glue sticks, paper, and possibly poster boards, as needed. (communal supplies may not be available)

## **District Technology Expectations:**

- Students will use the computers/technology as instructed to do so by the teacher.
   Students are permitted to use the device at home. Students are responsible for bringing it to class every day, fully charged.
- Students will secure the device when it is out of their sight. The device should not be left in an unlocked locker, a desk, or other location where someone else might take it. Students will be responsible for the replacement cost of the device.
- Students will treat the computers/technology with respect. Do not write or draw on the device or apply any stickers or labels. Handle the device carefully and ensure others do the same.. Students will keep the device out of places with extreme temperature or limited ventilation (e.g., in a car) for an extended period of time.
- No Right to Privacy. The devices are District property; therefore, the District may
  examine the devices and search their contents at any time for any reason. Neither
  students nor parents/guardians have any right to privacy of any data saved on the device
  or in a cloud-based account to which the device connects.
- Devices are actively monitored by GOGuardian for inappropriate websites, language, material, etc. Students can lose their technology privileges and receive disciplinary consequences if the District Technology Agreement is violated
- Broken technology needs to be immediately communicated to the teachers and district technology teams. No students should have broken technology for more than 24 hours.

#### **Attendance Expectation:**

- Attendance will be taken at the beginning of class. Students not in the room when the bell rings will be sent to Sweep. See student handbook for Sweep policies.
- Students who acquire 10 absences in a class will lose credit for that course (AFUHS
  District Attendance policy). Students will then be required to complete the attendance
  appeal process to get approval for credit(s) loss.

## **Classroom Expectations:**

- No Food and Drink in Classrooms (except during Power Hour).
- No Cell Phones/Electronic Devices unless given permission by the teacher.
- No Earbuds

#### **Homework**

 The expectation is for all students to utilize time in class to complete assignments and work collaboratively with their peers. Homework will not be assigned on a regular basis, but all practice and assignments are expected to be completed on or before the due dates.

- Late Work- Students will have 1 week from the date the assignment was due to turn in late work for credit. All assignments in a tested unit must be turned in prior to the unit exam. Ex. Colonial assignments must be turned in before the test over that unit.
- Make-up work- for every day missed in class per verified absence, students will be given
   2 days to complete and submit missed assignments or assessments.

#### **Assessments**

- Students will be assessed through a variety of formative assessments throughout the
  course of the year. Students will be assessed formatively through checks for
  understanding as well as common formative assessments and writing benchmark
  evaluations. Summative assessments such as midterm examinations, unit projects, and
  end of course assessments will be recorded and reflect students' educational growth.
- \*\*\*All summative assessments can be re-taken by students if a higher grade is desired, under two conditions. First, ALL coursework and projects/essays from the assessed unit must be finished. Secondly, the student must schedule a time with their instructor for the test to be taken. Make ups can not be more than 10 school days after the original assessment.\*\*\*

• \* Students' grades will be rounded to the next letter grade ONLY IF their final grade at the end of a semester is a .5 or higher. Example: 79.5 rounds to 80%, 89.2, does not round to 90%.
